What is the Further Forces Programme?

Further Forces supports anyone preparing to leave the Armed Forces to become technical teachers in Further Education.

The Education and Training Foundation Further Forces programme is funded by the Department for Education, and supported by the Ministry of Defence and Gatsby Charitable Foundation. It is for those leaving the Armed Forces (or who have left in the last five years) who wish to transition into Further Education technical teaching roles in England, using their technical expertise, knowledge, and skills.

The programme is distinct from Troops to Teachers which launched in 2013 and focuses on training Service Leavers to teach in primary or secondary schools.

The intention of the Further Forces Programme is to meet two key needs.

Need 1: Meet the high demand within the FE sector for skilled teachers who can bring expertise to technical education.

Need 2: The Ministry of Defence's commitment to supporting its Service Leavers' successful transition to civilian life.

The Service Leaver is provided with high-quality training as well as follow-on subject-specialist mentoring, leading to a nationally recognised teaching qualification and a job working as a teacher or trainer in the FE sector.



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I served as a Combat Medical Technician in the Army. The skills and knowledge gained in this role, coupled with my degree in sports science meant that I was well placed to embark upon a career in Further Education teaching and training.

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Which FE sector providers can get involved?

Any FE provider (colleges, independent training companies and organisations who have substantial in-house training programmes) can use Further Forces to find recruits for the 'hard to fill' teaching roles in technical education.

Further Forces funds trainee teachers in all technical subject areas:

- Agriculture, Environmental & Animal Care
- Business and Administrative
- Catering & Hospitality
- Childcare & Education
- Construction
- Creative & Design
- Digital
- Engineering & Manufacturing
- Hair & Beauty
- Health & Science
- Legal, Finance & Accounting

Who can apply to train?

Any Service personnel who are planning to leave the Armed Forces, or who have left in the past two years, can apply.

They must register by September 2020.

Are prior experience and qualifications required?

No, we are looking for people with technical knowledge and a desire to teach/train in the FE sector.

All that is expected of the Service Leaver is:

- GCSE Mathematics and English language at grade 4 (C) or above, or equivalent.
- A subject specialism or skill that the Service Leaver would teach or train.
- A willingness to undergo a DBS (criminal record) check which demonstrates they have no criminal convictions that would disqualify them from working with students aged under 18 or with vulnerable adults.

Service Leavers complete six workbooks before beginning their teacher training so they can get a sense of what teaching involves.

How much will this cost?

There is no cost for Service Leaver or for the FE employer. The total cost of training, including mentoring support, is provided by the ETF and the Gatsby Charitable Foundation.

How does the programme work?

When you contact Further Forces with details of your technical vacancies, we initially check whether there is a match with the skills and location of the Service

Leavers we already have in training. If there is not an immediate match, we will keep you updated of new recruits. We send out a fortnightly email with details of all the available recruits, their preferred region and skills.

It could also be the case that you identify a suitable Service Leaver for a technical teaching role who is not yet registered with us. We would then provide funding to support their training and mentoring.

All Service Leavers are enrolled onto a career transition programme that will prepare them for the transition between the Armed Forces and a teaching role in FE. Part of this programme will help develop their job application and interview skills.

You will be able to interview the suitable Service Leaver and select the candidate most appropriate for your vacancy.

If the interview is successful, you can recruit the Service Leaver into a salaried post (usually full-time or possibly part-time- 0.8 FTE). Alongside this employment, the Service Leaver will also be enrolled on a teacher training programme that, upon completion, will result in a University-awarded teaching qualification. The training will be delivered by either the Northern Hub - led by the AoC, or the Southern Hub - the University of Portsmouth. You can also be funded to

deliver the training in-house.

To begin your engagement with Further Forces, you can contact either the Northern or Southern Hub and we will connect you with the right person.

What support does Further Forces provide?

Throughout their training, recruits are supported by their Hub and also by a mentoring scheme, run through the University of Brighton. These mentors are FE practitioners and technical subject specialists, but they sit outside of both the training Hub and the FE provider, so the recruit has impartial, knowledgeable and personal support.

Recruiting subject-specialist mentors:

As we recruit more Service Leaver trainees, we need more subject-specialist mentors. Mentors are paid approximately £22 per hour.

Mentors will need:

- subject-specific expertise in technical education
- experience of teaching in FE sector
- previous experience of mentoring trainees.


Why should FE senior leaders and managers support this programme?

The UK is facing a serious skills shortage that could be exacerbated by Brexit. The FE sector plays an important part in addressing this shortage that is challenging both businesses in the local community and the UK's overall productivity.
